Overall outcome

The school does not meet all of the independent school standards that were checked during this inspection

Main inspection findings

Part 3. Welfare, health and safety of pupils

Paragraphs 7 to 7b

- At the time of the previous inspection in November 2024, the school's safeguarding arrangements were not fit for purpose. The school did not have an effective system in place for allowing pupils to express concerns about their safety or well-being. Safeguarding procedures were not used effectively in order to identify pupils who may require help, and staff members did not have a clear understanding of how to report concerns about pupils. Additionally, there was no online filtering and monitoring software in place, and the school lacked a systematic approach to managing safeguarding information and concerns.
- Since that time, the school has started to take steps to strengthen its safeguarding procedures. However, leaders acknowledge that there is still more work to be done to establish a robust safeguarding culture. The proprietor has commissioned external support to assist the school in implementing necessary changes. However, this support is still in the early stages, and the school has not developed well-established systems for overseeing safeguarding.
- The school has withdrawn its previous safeguarding policy but has not acted quickly enough to put a new policy in place. As a result, it currently lacks a clear written policy that outlines how safeguarding is managed at the school.
- The school has reviewed safeguarding roles and responsibilities. A new designated safeguarding lead (DSL) is in post, and they have a secure understanding of their role. Staff have had additional safeguarding training. This training has increased their awareness of the necessity to report all safeguarding concerns.
- Soon after the last inspection, the school implemented changes to improve how pupils share their concerns and worries. Through assemblies and discussions with tutors, pupils are now actively encouraged to talk to adults about their issues. As a result, they feel more confident in expressing their worries and seeking help.



- The school has begun to strengthen its approach to recording and managing safeguarding information. These records demonstrate the school is taking timely action to support pupils who need help. This support has involved the school working with external agencies when necessary. However, the approach to record-keeping is not fully developed and systems for managing safeguarding information are not clear. Some key staff are still not able to retrieve safeguarding information.
- The school has implemented a system for filtering and monitoring pupils' online classroom access. This includes school leaders monitoring the use of the school's internet on a daily basis.
- The unmet requirements in this part remain unmet.

Paragraphs 9a to 9c and 14

- The school's expectations for pupils' behaviour are clearly outlined in its policy. The school addresses incidents of negative behaviour and keeps a record of sanctions imposed for serious misbehaviour. Pupils are properly supervised during lessons and at unstructured times. They understand the school's rules and behave well. Pupils demonstrate positive attitudes toward learning and work hard. This makes the school a calm and purposeful environment in which to learn.
- These standards remain met.

Part 6. Provision of information

Paragraph 32(1) and 32(1)(c)

- Following the previous inspection, leaders intended to revise the school's safeguarding policy to reflect changes that had been made in roles and responsibilities. However, the school has not put a revised policy in place. Therefore, the school's website does not provide a safeguarding policy, and there is no clear, written document outlining how safeguarding is managed.
- This standard is not met.

Part 8. Quality of leadership in and management of schools

Paragraph 34(1) to 34(1)(c)

- At the time of the previous inspection, the proprietor had not maintained oversight of its duties in order to ensure that the school's safeguarding arrangements were effective.
- In March 2025, the school's plan to improve the quality of provision was submitted to the Department of Education (DfE) but judged not to be acceptable. The plan lacked specificity about the exact steps leaders intended to take in order to make necessary improvements. Since this time, the school has invited external support to provide guidance in drafting a more suitable plan of action. However, an acceptable plan is not in place.
- The proprietor has begun to take demonstrable steps to strengthen the school's safeguarding culture. These steps are starting to make a positive difference, but there is more work to do. Effective systems are not in place for the proprietor to maintain sufficient strategic oversight of the school's work. Lines of accountability and procedures



for leaders to monitor the effectiveness of the school's safeguarding procedures are not clear.

■ The unmet requirements in this part remain unmet.

Compliance with regulatory requirements

This included the standards and requirements that the school was judged to not comply with at the previous inspection. Not all of the standards and associated requirements were checked during this inspection.

Information about this school

- Jamia Islamia Birmingham is an independent Islamic day school for boys aged 11 to 19.
- The most recent standard inspection was 2 to 4 July 2024, when the school's overall effectiveness was judged to require improvement.
- A material change inspection was conducted on 28 November 2025, when the school was judged unlikely to meet the independent school standards that were checked.



- The school does not use any alternative provision.
- The school does not use any external supply staff.
- The previous headteacher left the school in February 2025. The chair of the proprietor board is now acting as headteacher and is supported by five other senior leaders. In addition, a new DSL, employed from within the school, started in post in December 2024.



Information about this inspection

- This inspection was carried out at the request of the DfE. The purpose of the inspection was to monitor the progress the school has made in meeting the independent school standards and other requirements that it was judged unlikely to meet at its previous inspection.
- This is the first monitoring inspection of the school since it was judged to not comply with the independent school standards in November 2024.
- The inspectors held discussions with the school's headteacher, the DSL and representatives of the proprietor board. These discussions focused on the progress made against the previously unmet independent school standards and the arrangements for safeguarding.
- The inspectors reviewed the single central record of checks made about the suitability of adults. They also looked at a range of other documents and a sample of safeguarding records.
- Inspectors spoke to staff and pupils to find out about their experiences at the school.
- This inspection was conducted without notice.
